



## AN OPEN LETTER TO THE EDITOR OF THE "PITTSBURGH HEADLINES"

Dear Mr. Marton:

In Juancito's column, "On The Upstream Side" he has had to spend some considerable time defending himself and his section from the slurs of this character. Panhandle Pete. 




